DOLOMITE SKI GROUP





It was Famèe Furlane Toronto member, Adriano Decillia's love for skiing that was the inspiration for the founding of The Dolomite Ski Group in 1973. Adriano became its first President, and he along with Arrigo Rossi, Carla Rossi, Lou Roman, Sante Fasan and Daniela Scaini were its founding committee members. Initially independent, later as a result of then FFT President, Eddy Del Medico's mandate to organize FFT sports groups, this ski group naturally assumed its place under the FFT umbrella, while retaining its autonomy.

Adopting the name "Dolomite Ski Group", it quickly became very active. Weekend trips included Mt. Tremblant, Quebec; Stowe and Jay Peak, Vermont and day excursions to such places as Blue Mountain and Beaver Valley. As membership expanded, including family outings, Snow Valley quickly became a big party every ski weekend. As the group's administration started to formalize, the annual weekend trip to Mt. Tremblant quickly became a "Must Go" where it remains its annual highlight to this day. Its reputation was attracting others and before long a group fondly referred to as the "Abruzzesi" soon joined and brought with it new friendships and much fun-loving rivalry both on and off the hills. Who will ever forget the fun competitions at Mt. Tremblant each year when the cuisine of each region was not only put to the test but immensely enjoyed! Another element in its growth was media coverage and TV exposure. Paolo Canciani, then with Chanel 47 Multilingual TV invited co-founder Arrigo Rossi to be interviewed.

Cross Country Skiing introduced by FIS European members and cemented by Adriano Decillia's enthusiasm quickly became another component with "must attend" cross country outings at The Eaton Estate (Seneca College) in King City. These much-enjoyed organized excursions were always followed by family gatherings on location. The Dolomites were truly evolving into a group that was all inclusive, including young and old alike in addition to all levels of expertise. The focus was to gather and enjoy!

Since the start, highlights and memories are too many to mention, but a few most memorable that ignited unparalleled pride in our friulanitat include our hosting of the Italian Ski Team in March of 1994. After the competition which took place in Thunder Bay, Ontario, arrangements were made for their stop at the Famèe Furlane Toronto prior to returning to Italy. The hosting of this ski team which included Olympic Manuela DiCenta, 3 time gold medalist, 1 silver and 1 bronze, along with cross country skier, gold medalist, Silvio Fauner, has been the most memorable highlight to date for this group.

Other highlights include guest visits by CBC's Brian Williams and Ken Read of the "Crazy Canucks" at our 1995 Members Banquet. Dolomite members also travelled to Quebec City to enjoy races by Alberto Tomba and Gustavo Thoeni who were then presented with gifts from both the Ski Group as well as the Famèe Furlane Toronto. On another occasion, a trip to Mt. Tremblant resulted in a photo opportunity when "bumping" into then Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau.

Like everything, the group has evolved over time and sadly some of its members have passed away. Mt. Tremblant is now its main event, and its annual ski race is in honour of Adriano DeCillia. It has been the determination of this group of skiers, today under the leadership of Mara Mian, that have carried the group through some rough patches, made even more difficult throughout covid. However, the one dominant attribute common to all in the Group is the strong bonds made and the tremendous fun shared, not to mention of course the exhilarating feeling of skiing down the hills, whether black, blue or green!

FASCINATING LINKS – ITALY & UKRAINE

From the start, we have been following with horror, the ongoing tragedies taking place in Ukraine. We, along with the rest of the world, strongly and publicly condemn Russia's invasion. While aware of the current shocking situation and standing united in supporting the Ukrainian people,

we would like to reprint an article first published in the Forum in December of 2009. Not only does this most interesting and informative piece provide historical information on Italian immigration to Ukraine and the valuable contribution made to its economic, cultural and artistic growth, but also provides a most interesting insight on the future of cultural assimilation overall, a topic easily related to at a time of change for us at the Famèe Furlane Toronto.

TORONTO & ODESSA A COMMON HISTORY FOR ITALIANS

Some of us in the Furlan and Italian community have often discussed and pondered what is to become of our culture as the generations pass and the ties to our ancestral homeland become ever fainter. While we can look to a similar experience south of us in the USA to compare to (where they are generally considered to be a generation or two ahead of us in terms of the first Italian immigrants) there is an example farther back in history which we could also learn from.

The fall of Communism in the early 1990's has allowed scholars and researchers to comb through previously unavailable books, newspapers, archives and photographs in Eastern Europe and Russia. One of those researchers is Anna Makolkin at the Frank Iacobucci Centre for Italian Studies at the University of Toronto. Anna has now written two books on the subject of Italian emigration and the founding of the city of Odessa in the Ukraine. Her latest book is entitled: "The Nineteenth Century in Odessa: One Hundred Years of Italian Culture on the Shores of the Black Sea".

How many of you knew that in the late 1790's thousands of Italians left their homeland and emigrated to a new country and city on the Black Sea as Russia was expanding its territory and welcoming new immigrants to build the new city of Odessa? The materials about this obscure migration have been scattered in archives in Italy and the Ukraine. Anna Makolkin is the first author to have explored these valuable rare archives. In a book review done by Dr Terence J Fay, S.J. Professor of Church History at U of T, he says that (Anna Makolkin) "explores the many coloured threads (of immigration), identifying the Northern Italian adventurers who transported themselves and their culture to establish a rich and beautiful city, a replica of their homeland".

In an interview Makolkin gave to Deborah Verginella of Partners Magazine (published quarterly by the Italian Chamber of Commerce of Toronto) she was asked what first led her to research this topic. She responded that there is a verse in one of Alexander Pushkin's poems that mentions Italian being spoken on the streets of Odessa in 1824. Research led her to find out that Italian was the "Lingua Franca" of the entire Black Sea region from about 1794 until 1857. Italian was the language of commerce at the ports, at customs offices and in the banks.

Giuseppe De Ribas, born and raised in Italy of Spanish parents was the first governor of Odessa. He then commissioned several Italian architects such as Toricelli, Boffo and the Frapolli brothers to create a city based on the renaissance theme and nick-named it 'La Citta Ideale'. Many of the buildings, streets and theatres were modelled after Italian originals like the Spanish Steps in Rome. By 1850, Odessa became the most non-Russian city in Russia.

The 1850's marked the turning point in the adventures of Italian influence in Odessa. Germany was beginning to assert itself as a national power in the middle of Europe. The British and French naval forces bombed Odessa during the Crimean war. There was Italian unification happening back in the homeland and nationalism was beginning to appear in Russia. It was no longer acceptable to speak anything but Russian in any official capacity. The grand-children of the original Italian immigrants were now forced to change their last names, inter-marry or leave the city. By 1890, according to Makolkin, there were only a few traces of the 100 years of Italian presence. Today we are left with only the enduring architecture of the theatres, monuments, and buildings as a sign of the cultural past.

In the United States they are approximately at the 100-year mark of Italian immigration, well into the fourth and fifth generation of Italian descendants. Although we have not seen the political nationalism that happened in Russia, the American experience has been one of cultural assimilation. The melting pot approach of being American with no hyphens has certainly hastened the severance of cultural and linguistic ties to Italy.

In Canada, we have the mosaic model of immigration where hyphens are not only accepted but encouraged. Many acknowledge that the city of Toronto flourished in the 1960's after the thousands of Italian immigrants created a base here in the 1950's. If we use 1932 as the base when the Famèe Furlane was founded, we have another 23 years before we reach the century mark in Canada. What will our Italian and Furlan heritage look like in 2032? I think we have a much better chance than the experiences of Odessa and America.

FAMÈE FURLANE WOMEN'S AUXILARY

FRIULIANS SUPPORTING UKRAINIAN REFUGEES

Markus Maurmair, is mayor of Valvasone Arzene, Pordenone. When we first talked, he was happy to explain that they had recently welcomed twenty-two Ukrainian "*profughi*" or refugees, and that lodging for everyone, was now in place! This phone call confirmed what my zio had told me earlier that the village, of some 4,000 people, is part of a humanitarian effort that Europe had not seen in a very long time.

Mayor Maurmair proceeded to share the arrangements they had made for their Ukrainian guests. The Comune and the Parish of Arzene were able to provide full accommodations and support for three families with the others being accommodated in the homes of their families, friends, or private citizens. Since the profughi arrived with few possessions, they are dependent on their hosting families and the general public for all necessities including food, clothing, and furniture. In addition, the Comune committed to providing them with a monthly stipend funded by the Comune and charitable donations from residents and businesses.

Like many around the world, I was moved by the horrific destruction and senseless loss of life. I admired the nearby countries that stepped up to welcome the Ukrainians, providing shelter, food, and medical services for the millions crossing their borders. Profughi traveling to Italy mostly entered via Friuli Venezia Giulia. As a first generation Canadian whose parents immigrated to Canada from their beloved Valvasone in search of a better life, it was fitting to extend a helping hand to those Ukrainians fleeing a war zone, even if it was only temporary.

Calls to friends confirmed their support of the Valvasone Arzene humanitarian effort. We felt it was the right thing to do especially when it lessens the burden for their friulian hosts. Over the next month we each reached out to our families and friends in Canada with roots in Valvasone. Then local friends and groups, such as the Catholic Women's League, expressed interest in donating as well. With all this generous support we were able to donate over \$5,600 to the Comune of Valvasone for this cause.

I learned from the Councillor of Education and Youth Policies for Valvasone Arzene, that there is a lot of responsibility, effort and cost required to successfully integrate profughi into the local community. First, she ensured that any child whose parent was not present had a Ukrainian guardian. The young children attend nursery school, and the older ones are enrolled at the local school where they learn Italian and interact with their peers. The adults were given the option to attend a 50-hour Italian language program. This would be the first step in creating a resume which will help them find suitable employment. Organized events such as the ecological day, the sagra in Casarsa also encourages integration. Donated bicycles give the adults much needed independence for daily routines.

So, life carries on in Valvasone Arzene. The villagers quickly mobilized to accommodate their guests' needs, learning and discovering along the way. And the guests are grateful for all they are receiving from their hosts. However, they do long for the day they will return home to their families and beloved Ukraine.

There are a number of organizations in Canada, including local churches and the Red Cross, that will accept donations to the Ukrainian humanitarian cause. ATOR LA TAULA

Gnocchi originated in Northern Italy, where potatoes were in abundance due to a better suited temperate climate as potatoes don't enjoy the heat. Gnocchi were inexpensive, easy to prepare and considered a peasant delicacy. Accompaniments commonly used for gnocchi included simple tomato sauce, butter and sage or butter with cinnamon and sugar, just to name a few. Today, the variety of sauces used for gnocchi have flourished. Everything from exotic to basic, as well as savory or sweet, there are options for every gnocchi connoisseur taste preference.

While seasonal and mostly enjoyed when Italian, or other small plums, are in season, the classic fruit gnocchi is a dish one can never eat enough of! The traditional way of enjoying these fruity delicacies is with a dusting of cinnamon sugar and topping them of with melted butter.

A very popular dish in Trieste, capital city of Friuli Venezia Giulia, once under the rule of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, Marylane Marchese has offered up this recipe courtesy of her Austrian maternal grandmother, Nonna Maria. Marylane's mom, Teresa D'Agnolo, enjoyed learning and making them as a child alongside her mom. Today, the tradition carries on as not only do Teresa and Marylane continue making them together, but also teaching their next generation, young grandniece Alyssa. Throughout Marylane's childhood many a Gnocchi di Susine was enjoyed especially when prepared with fresh plums harvested from their backyard tree. Enjoy!

PLUM GNOCCHI (Gnocchi di Susine)

INGREDIENTS

DIRECTIONS

Dough: 2 pounds of Yukon gold potatoes

4 cups of flour 4 teaspoons salt 1 beaten egg

Filling:

1 – 1 ¼ lb of Italian plums washed and pitted

Topping:

3/4 cup of butter 1 cup of breadcrumbs ground cinnamon sugar Place the potatoes in a large pot filled with water and bring to a boil. Cook until tender. Drain the potatoes and peel. On a working surface, mash the potatoes with a potato ricer. When cool enough to handle add the flour, salt and beaten egg. Mix well to form a soft dough.

On a lightly floured surface cut off small amounts of dough to form thick ropes and cut each rope into pieces. Flatten each piece into a 3" circle and place a pitted plum in the centre and wrap dough around the plum and seal tightly. Place aside on a floured surface and continue stuffing the remaining gnocchi.

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Working in batches, place gnocchi in the water and once they rise to the top let boil for a few minutes. Remove each plum dumpling with a slotted spoon and place on a platter.

In a skillet melt butter over medium heat. Add breadcrumbs, cook and stir until golden brown, about 3-4 minutes. In a separate small bowl mix ground cinnamon and sugar. Top each dumpling with a teaspoon of browned breadcrumbs and sprinkle with cinnamon sugar.

DONALD ZIRALDO PASSION AND DETERMINATION

We are all more than familiar with the success of Inniskillin wines, and Donald Ziraldo's achievements in developing Inniskillin into a brand that is recognized not just in Canada, but globally. In this piece, we'd like to focus in on the man himself and how, through his father's inspiration, turned his farming roots and his passion for land, into the worldwide acclaimed industry, putting Canada on the map as a wine producer, most particularly with his famous Canadian icewine.

Born in St. Catharines, Ontario in 1948, the first of three sons to Fiorello and Irma Ziraldo, Donald was raised in the world of farming in the Niagara Region.

In 1923, his father, native of Fagagna, Udine, had emigrated to Canada through Ellis Island at the age of 15. With the promise of greater opportunities in Canada, Fiorello then travelled north to Timmins where he spent 23 years digging for gold in the McIntyre mines. With the money saved from the mines, he purchased a parcel of land in the Niagara Region and in 1947 Fiorello returned to his native Fagagna, met, fell in love with and married Irma Schiratti before returning to Canada. He and Irma, set up a life of farming, a passion imported from his Friulian roots, as was had by his father before him. Through Ziraldo Farms and Nursery, Donald was deeply entrenched in the world of farming from an early age. The family business consisted of mixed fruit farming and included a mix of French hybrid grapes, uncommon to the region at the time.

It was through the everyday examples set by his parents, that Donald was instilled with a vigorous work ethic and a deep interest in the family farming business; attributes that have served his well throughout his successful carrier.

At the young age of 15, Donald sadly lost his dad to silicosis, brought on by his 23 years of mining. As the oldest son he was then confronted with having to assume serious responsibilities with the family business. Despite his added responsibilities, and due to his mother's insistence of the value of education, he enrolled at the University of Guelph to study agricultural sciences. While Mom managed the farm throughout the week, Donald would travel home each weekend to work and help with the family business, in addition to his school workload.

In 1971 Donald graduated from University with a Bachelor of Science-Applied Horticulture & Horticulture Business Services degree. As a graduation gift, his mom presented him with a solid gold ring, hand crafted by his dad with ore collected at the Timmins mine over the years. It was his dad's wish that Donald receive this ring. Whether ironic or serendipitous, carved into the ring was a bunch of grapes. There is was, from his dad... inspiration for his future, right in the ring! This gift and its significance led Donald to focus on exploring and developing wines.

His immediate goal was to improve the quality of Canadian wines and through his experimenting and research realized that due to similarities in latitude of both Friuli and Niagara, varieties of grapes grown in Friuli could also be cultivated in Niagara. This idea was very much worth exploring, and thus began the journey.

It was a few years after he began with his experimenting that he met Karl Kaiser. Karl, native of Austria, went to Donald's farm for the sole purpose of purchasing some of his European grapes to make his own wine. Donald and Karl immediately struck up a friendship, sparked by their likeminded views on the needed improvement to Canadian wine quality. This friendship soon was further cemented by a business partnership – the formation of Inniskillin Wines Inc., established in 1975 and was the first winery license issued by the Province of Ontario since prohibition in 1929. As the adage goes - "*the rest is history*".



As the success of their collaboration grew from making premium Riesling, Chardonnay and Gamay, it further expanded with Karl's "*crazy*" notion of making Icewine, very familiar to him due to his Austrian roots. Over the next 30 years, while Karl continued to hone excellence in Canadian wine production, Donald's passion and knowledge transitioned to marketing, recognizing its vital role for the success of Canadian wines, most particularly their own iconic icewine. Through his determination in the promotion of the Canadian wine industry, today Donald is recognized as a renowned Canadian figure.

On a personal level, Donald has been recipient of numerous recognitions including the Order of Ontario in 1993 and Order of Canada in 1998 along with an honorary Doctorate of Laws from Brock University. In 1999 he was named as one of the top twenty-five Canadian CEOs of the century and in 2008 he was awarded the Premio Masi by his peers in Verona, Italy. In 2010 the Folio D'oro from Friuli, Italy was added to his prestigious awards, while in 2013 he was inducted into the Agriculture Hall of Fame. This list I'm sure is not complete, but allows one to better understand how foretelling was his father's gift.

With the burgeoning accumulation of awards and recognitions resulting from an almost lifetime of commitment, passion and vigorous work ethics, his personal life took a back seat until 2012 when his son Aspen was born and now is his sole focus as he continues his passion, which he shares with his 9-yearold son.

Another vital component to Donald's make up is his pride in his Italian roots. Consistently reaching back to his roots, whether it be with the initial explorations of Italian grapes, more recently, his tribute to *Picolit*, a wine native to Fagagna, through his *Bianco di Fagagna*, and his production of Prosecco in Valdobbiabene, and everything in between, Donald is a proud *Furlan*! Annual visits to Italy, sharing his roots and culture with young Aspen ensures this strong sentiment continues.

However, his pride is shared with his love for Canada. Born and raised in Canada, and a fierce Canadian, Donald is often quoted as saying "...I am fiercely proud of my Friulan blood in Canadian skin!".

ICAP AND THE FFT HERITAGE ARCHIVES PROJECT (FFT-HAP)

The Fogolârs Federation of Canada and the Famèe Furlane Toronto have been members of ICAP for several years now. Founded in 2010 and currently planning its 12th annual conference and AGM at Pier 21 on October 14-15, 202, the Italian-Canadian Archives Project organization is a members-based, national not-for-profit organization with charitable status that serves 1) to engage communities to identify, secure and document their local Italian-Canadian narratives and 2) to collaborate with local groups, archives, individuals, or other professional institutions to preserve their local history. Supported by members and donors, ICAP provides networking resources and best practices for archival initiatives (physical or virtual) intended to preserve cultural heritage and to trace and capture the impact of the Italian-Canadian migrant community.

ICAP works to create project models in which mainstream archives and communities assume distributed custody of the communities' memory texts. Over the past decade, ICAP has supported many documentary-heritage projects that have received funding from both private and governmental funders. In 2017, ICAP successfully applied for a Documentary Heritage Communities Program (DHCP) grant to support the Sarnia-Lambton project, which digitized and preserved the oral history testimonies of Italian-Canadians in that region and developed a standardized set of best practices for conducting and archiving these materials. In January 2022, building on its strengths and previous successes, ICAP applied to Young Canada Works, the national program for the employment of young students, once again. On this occasion the project titled FFT Heritage Archives Project (for Summer 2022) was submitted for the purpose of securing an Archives Assistant to continue the cultural preservation work of Famèe Furlane Toronto (FFT) at its home campus at Islington and Steeles in Toronto. The donor who provided the 25% of the funds required to leverage the YCW application was Donald Ziraldo of Ziraldo Estate Winery. Donald is a strong supporter of archives and donated all the documentation concerning his story and that of the Inniskillin Winery from 1974 to 2006 to the Brock University Library in St. Catharines.

As La Cisilute readers will know, the Famèe Furlane Toronto was established in 1932 as a mutual benefit society for Italian immigrants coming from region of Friuli-Venezia Giulia, Italy. FFT is the largest of the 17 clubs located in Canada and retains paper and video documentation as well as artifacts as part of their existing collection. Since FFT's foundation, there have been attempts to preserve the records of their activities, but these formats are obsolete and not available to a national or international audience. Thus, the need to catalogue and preserve the records of FFT, as well as any future archival fonds they may receive, has resulted in the creation of the FFT Heritage Archives Project (FFT-HAP). FFT is currently in the process of completing its library cataloguing project using the Dewey decimal system to organize its extensive book collection. These books are being documented according to professional standards by a FFT volunteer, an Emeritus Librarian from the University of Toronto's Faculty of Information. The remaining materials, including boxes of documents, newsletters, videos, audio recordings, and artifacts need to be identified and organized once the library work has been completed. This process constitutes the first phase of the Famèe Furlane Toronto Heritage Archives Project.

With and for its collaborators, ICAP provides resources and develops models for heritage preservation work. These serve not only to support the heritage preservation goals of the FFT, but also provide models for other Fogolârs in Canada. In the coming months, the FFT-HAP archival assistant will identify materials at risk so that they can then be preserved and cataloged according to the standards recommended by professional archival organizations. The long-term goal is to digitize all the FFT records so that they can be accessed on a national and international level and later turned into an online exhibit. ICAP is pleased to announce that they've hired Alex Wall, a recent graduate of the University of Guelph (B.A. in English and History; M.A. in History) with plans to pursue an M.A. in Library and Information Science in the fall. Alex has experience as a researcher/archivist at Country Heritage Park where he researched, transcribed, and scanned old agricultural newspapers and wrote articles on various related subjects to provide content for Farms.com and the Elgin County Railway Museum, where he reorganized and updated the Canada Southern Station's archive. Alex's mother is of Italian origin, so he is delighted to get started with the FFT project, which requires him also to practice his Italian language skills and learn to familiarize himself with Furlan. The work begins in mid-May under the supervision of Gabriella Colussi Arthur*, and Lauretta Santarossa, current board member at FFT.

MORE NEWS ON THE ICAP-FFT ARCHIVE PROJECT



On May 17, the documenting of the Famèe Furlane Toronto began. Here's a photo of our archivist Alex Wall. Thanks to the generosity of Donald Ziraldo, ICAP was able to hire Alex to start documenting and listing our extensive archives on a data base which we hope will eventually lead to a digitization of all the archives and eventually make them searchable by our club members as well as historians and scholars in the future. We were able also to purchase the needed professional archive approved supplies, boxes and file folders needed to preserve the photos and papers in the archives with some of the proceeds of our Famèe book sale. ICAP is hoping that what we do here at the Famèe will become a standard and example for Italian Canadian clubs and groups across Canada so that we can preserve our history and stories.

ICAP was currently funding the project with Donald's donation but on June 21 we got the wonderful news that the grant from the YCW (Young Canada Works) office was released so that we could fully fund the work that Alex is doing until the end of the summer. **YCW provides funding to employers to create jobs for students and internships for graduates**. These programs help youth acquire skills in the heritage, arts and cultural sector, as well as develop their second language.

The YCW grant only covers the employment of our student archivist. We still need funds to purchase archive boxes and the proper materials to preserve the documents from further deterioration. 

The lovely weather has brought joy to the tenants of Friuli Terrace. The garden beds have been dug up and planted, there is lots of outdoor fresh air time, and much socialization! The tenants have also been able to enjoy indoor events such as exercise classes and bingo nights.



The Friuli Terrace building is a rental building like all others and continues to undergo regular maintenance to keep it in good shape, including: air condition units that leak, backflow prevention device installation, HVAC and Boiler updates, painting of the hallways and threshold renovations, Fire Inspection updates and repair of interlocking brick at the front of the building.

There are two very important issues that we are addressing for the coming year. One is the increased need for parking spots for our tenants. We are running low on options, and we will be numbering and marking all Friuli Terrace parking spots whether they are for tenants or for visitors. Many of our new tenants require parking spots, and there is a limited supply in place. As well, there is an urgent need to fix the roof of the bocce court, which is leaking. We have been getting estimates from roofing contractors, and they are in the \$108,000 to \$168,000 range. This is a very large expense that Friuli Terrace will not be able to allocate at one time.

Finally, thanks to the support of York Region, and the Provincial and Federal Governments, capital funds have been allocated for the elevator modernization, window and roof replacements.

We are always grateful to our Property Managers Cynthia and Lora, and our Superintendent Paola for all their hard work.
